General Assembly

Resolution AFCO

After the opening of the GA by president Fleur Peterse, the parliamentarians started off with the resolution of the Committee of Constitutional Affairs, about the rising euroscepticism. The Dutch delegate held a very strong opening speech, in which she emphasised the rising euroscepticism, the fact that the functionality of the EU is questioned and its bureaucratic exterior. The member states are losing their nationality and the committee assumes their resolution is the first step against Euroscepticism. She ended with: "A little is a little, but together a little becomes a lot."

The UK suggested an amendment to add the following clause to the resolution: "Urges member states to increase funding to promote organisations such as MEP through the use of social media and advertisements." With 31 in favour and 33 against the amendment was rejected.

The speech against the resolution was held by Germany.

He attacked the resolution on the low efficiency; the resolution wouldn't solve the problem and was just pushing the problem forward. "Would you put your own life at risk with this resolution? I dare you to vote in favour for this resolution."

The resolution didn't pass the GA with a voting of 26 in favour and 37 against, o abstention.

Resolution ITRE

With Coen Wassink as president of the third resolution, the Committee of Industry, Technology, Research and Energy submitted their resolution about the issue of outdated nuclear power plants. Again the opening speech was held by a Dutch delegate and he advised everyone that we have to protect ourselves from another Fukushima Daiichi, by leaving the science by the scientists.

Belgium suggested to add a new clause to the resolution, which was: "encourages the government of each member state to inform their citizens about the positive effect of consuming iodine tablets during the exposure to radioactive radiation."

Support by the Netherlands for informational part, benefit for the resolution, defended by the UK. "What would we achieve if, that costs money, is our motto?" They argued that the rest of the resolution already informs citizens sufficiently. The committee voted for the amendment, which was unexpected because of the disagreement they had several minutes before. With 54 votes in favour and 13 against, the amendment passed the GA and was added to the resolution.

The journalists didn't expect that the resolution would pass, because of the heavy debate about the safety of nuclear power, during and after its use. Let's hope the GA voted with certitude.





Resolution LIBE I

The president started the assembly by collecting the amendments and factual changes. In the opening speech, a delegate from Luxembourg started by explaining how many refugees there are and that many of them run to Western Europe for peace and freedom. The delegate then explained that proper shelter is crucial for the refugees. Het ended his speech with "the refugees come to Europe expecting paradise, but they experience hell." The first, and only, amendment that had an objection was number 6. This amendment stated that refugees should receive special treatment in jail. After a debate, the amendment was rejected. The open debate was mainly about the amount of refugees countries should take in. The general assembly was concerned about poor countries taking in refugees. The committee had a solution for this problem: financial aid. OC number 8 was also discussed. This OC states that financial aid should go to the core of the problem (countries like Syria). Someone from the assembly stated that governments are corrupt in these countries and that financial aid will not go to the working man. But this delegate too, was put down fast. The concluding speech of the committee ended with "all for one and one for all, united we stand together we fall." The resolution was passed with a vote of 34 in favour and 26 against.



Resolution LIBE II

Like the other committees, LIBE 2 started off with an opening speech. In this speech a delegate explained that countries have to share more information about terrorism and that there is a lack of sufficient communication. He made it clear that sharing information is crucial for a safer and more united Europe. Part of the General Assembly wanted to make an addition to the resolution. They wanted to create one big database in which governments and taskforces could look up any information regarding terrorists. The amendment did not pass. The committee made it clear that the big database would make the process of looking up information slower. During the open debate the issue of the collaboration between Facebook and the EU came up. A delegate pointed out that Facebook bought Whatsapp and that Whatsapp has recently encrypted all their messages. Facebook doesn't have access to any information from Whatsapp so how will the EU receive it? The committee went against this with stating that Facebook can get access to any encrypted messages if needed. Suspicious actions allow Facebook to do so.

After more debating and laughing about the "European Union", the committee gave a very touching end speech. The speech was in memory of a 16 year old French girl who died during a terrorist attack. "A vote in favour is a vote for safety" the delegate said. With 24 in favour and 34 against, the resolution did not pass.

Resolution EMPL

The last resolution with Fleur Peterse as president was during the resolution of the Committee on Employment and Social Affairs. Youth unemployment is one of the biggest problems in the EU and in some member states the ratio is above 50%. Unemployment leads to problems like the brain drain and criminality. "Ambitions must be found, we're the next generation, we are the future."

The UK suggested to substitute OC 2 by:

"Encourages EU member states to implement a quota law concerning enterprises requiring that at least 15% of other new employees are between the ages of 16-25 unless the enterprise requires employees to have an undergone extensive training."

The committee didn't defend the amendment and accepted to change the OC. Like expected the amendment passed.

There was an attack by Belgium, they had the suggestion to create laws for a general minimum age for when you can leave school, what would mean some countries would have to lower their minimum age. The committee only gave really contradictious answers. We just think: "what happened in this committee by creating this OC?"

After a quite light debate the resolution passed with 44 in favour and 16 against, 10 abstention.

ENDING

The official closing ceremony of WEMEP 2016 started at 5 pm. For the closing ceremony there were 2 guest speakers. The first speaker was the German Ambassador of the Netherlands mr. Dirk Brengelmann. He talked about the problems facing the EU. The rising euroscepticism and the refugee crisis were problems that mr. Brengelmann addressed that he thought should be tackled. He said that he was very happy to see here that there are still young people willing to come together and participate in European politics. The next speaker was Devika Partiman. She is a social activist in Amsterdam. She demonstrates against racism and for women rights. She felt that demonstrating has been made more effective due to social media. You can find people with similar views more easily. After this Manon van de Ven, conference manager, said a few words. She wanted to tell us that everyone did an amazing job. She also thanked everyone that helped us.

So, this is it. The end of WEMEP 2016. The day we have all feared and looked forward to. We have feared it because it is the end of one of the best weeks of our life. We have looked forward to it because we are all incredibly exhausted. Either way, it has come to a close.
